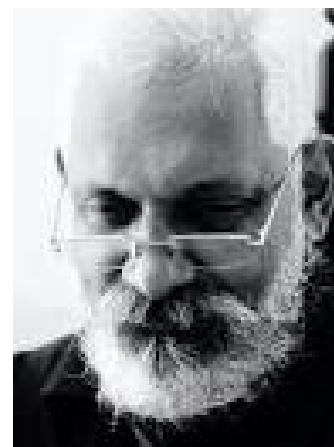


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PRAXIS OF PARTICIPATION - LOOKING BACK AT THE YEAR

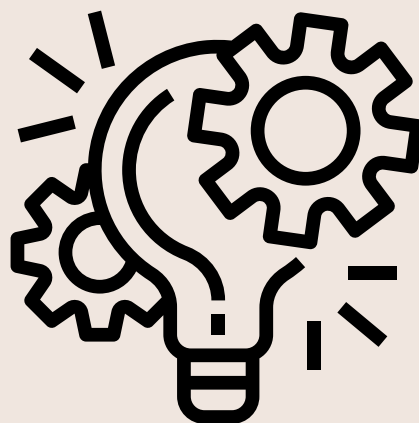

OUR WORK WITH CHILDREN

In collaboration with UNICEF, Praxis is currently engaged in a comprehensive review of the State Plan of Action for Children (SPAC) in partnership with the Social Welfare Department of the Government of Bihar. Praxis is also actively formulating the District Action Plan for Children (DPAC) for the districts of Purnea and Araria. This revision process is being approached with a distinct focus on incorporating principles of equity, inclusivity for individuals with disabilities, preparedness for disasters, and adaptability to climate change impacts. As part of the engagement, through the year, Praxis engaged with government officials, community members in different parts of Bihar and experts, surveyed the work already being done by the government to evolve the State Plan of Action for Children for the next five years from 2023-27. The plan looks at the four child rights principles of survival, development, protection and participation and is divided across priority areas such as health, education, nutrition, WaSH and adolescent empowerment.



OUR WORK WITH CHILDREN

The initiative titled 'Institutionalising Community-Led Child Protection through Inter-Agency Collaboration and Learning in Jharkhand' sought to establish a robust framework for community-led child protection by fostering active community involvement and collaboration among various agencies. The core objectives included enhancing accessibility, generating demand, and establishing a proficient monitoring mechanism for child protection services. The initiative was carried out through a consortium, encompassing a range of activities designed to cultivate a community-led methodology. This approach garnered significant recognition as an exemplary community engagement practice for child protection, effectively complementing the conventional top-down system of addressing such issues.



NOMADIC & DENOTIFIED TRIBES

Between October 2022 and March 2023, Praxis established a strong foundational framework for a project on Empowering Public Health Community Health Workers to Mitigate Human Trafficking Among De-notified and Nomadic Tribes (DNTs). This critical phase encompassed a series of steps, starting with a baseline process, which involved questionnaire development, identifying suitable research locations, understanding the field areas, assembling a team of researchers with external experts and community-based researchers and building their capacity through a rigorous orientation process (pic below). Praxis also instituted an Institutional Review Board process and developed a systematic Randomised Control Trial methodology to uphold the rigour and credibility of the study. Praxis also formed a Community Ethical Review Board, composed of eight members representing diverse social identities. This board has the responsibility of periodically assessing the research processes to ensure ethical concerns are adhered to.



MIGRANT WORKERS

The Action Reflection model for improving the quality of life of migrant labourers and urban is aimed at addressing the pressing challenges faced by this vulnerable population residing in the slums within the municipal area of Patna. To achieve this objective, the project focuses on collecting and compiling information from slums using participatory tools, interacting with women on the issues of health, hygiene and gender relations, strengthening urban livelihoods, and working with children through educational and cultural activities. By combining these strategies, the Action Reflection model aspires to create a positive impact on the lives of migrant labourers in Patna's slums. Ultimately, the project aims to bring about sustainable improvements in their living conditions, health, livelihoods, and overall well-being, contributing to a more inclusive and equitable urban environment.

GARMENT WORKERS

The project aims to engage with workers, experts and selected suppliers to develop an understanding of the grievance-related situation in the garment sector and seek their inputs for developing a framework for grievance redressal mechanism in the context of the Indian garment sector. As part of this Praxis is working to Identify key elements that contribute to the success and failures of grievance redressal mechanisms and finding potential and existing linkages between varied grievance redressal mechanisms that enable effective access to remedy for garment workers.

COMMUNITIES ENGAGED IN SANITATION WORK

'Empowering Communities Engaged in Sanitation Work for Collective Action, is centred on enhancing access to education and livelihood opportunities for sanitation workers through a community collective agency approach. Praxis undertook significant efforts, including field visits, Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) Training, and comprehensive training sessions on accessing entitlements. These initiatives were specifically directed towards village mobilisers and block leaders in Kanpur, Uttar Pradesh, as well as Theni and Virudhunagar districts in Tamil Nadu. In parallel, the project identified promising youth from these communities and provided them with essential support for education and entrepreneurship, fostering a holistic approach to upliftment within the target groups. COMMUNITY-DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES

Bridging Gaps In Access



Praxis has been collaboratively working with disadvantaged youth on various focal points including sanitation, education, child protection, and the welfare of Denotified Tribes (DNT) and marginalised communities across four districts of Bihar. Using Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) workshops, comprehensive training modules, and facilitating opportunities for interaction and collaboration with prominent civil society entities in the state, Praxis actively enhanced the skills and capabilities of the young individuals to spearhead community-driven developmental initiatives.

INFORMING JOURNEY TOWARDS ODF-SUSTAINABILITY

Community Leave No One Behind (CLNOB) is a new participatory approach designed to enable sustained access to safely managed sanitation facilities for people who were unable to access benefits of the first phase of India's national sanitation campaign, the Swachh Bharat Mission – Gramin (SBM-G). It encourages communities to identify both challenges and solutions in their journey towards open defecation free sustainability (ODF-S). The Water Supply and Sanitation Collaborative Council (WSSCC) and the Sanitation Learning Hub at the Institute of Development Studies (IDS) worked together to trial CLNOB in five rural districts in India (Mirzapur in Uttar Pradesh, Ranchi in Jharkhand, Kamrup in Assam, South 24 Parganas in West Bengal and Purnea in Bihar) from June to October 2020. With the next phase of CLNOB work beginning in June 2022, there was a need for a learning exercise to help document the key outcomes and impacts of the approach to inform the next phase of scale up and roll out of the CLNOB in June 2022. It is set against this context that Praxis carried out this learning exercise (pic below).



BUILDING AWARENESS & UPTAKE OF GOVERNMENT SCHEMES

The Collect Risk Communication & Community Engagement [C-RCCE] is a community led initiative spread across 70 districts in 11 states, encompassing 560 hamlets. The programme is an extension of the journey started in 2020 where the major focus was on COVID-19 appropriate behaviour and community mobilisation to get COVID-19 vaccination. The 11 states are: Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Odisha, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal.

A key objective of this initiative was to create a flow of information between those who were at the margins, the authorities and wider society. The target area of the programme was hamlets inhabited by Dalit, tribal communities and the Denotified and nomadic tribes; and within them focusing on those further marginalised because of identities of religion, age, gender and disability. Working with fellows and coordinators on the ground, who hail from these communities, this initiative also aimed to strengthen ground-level accountability systems. Through these efforts, C-RCCE aimed to bridge information gaps and empower these communities with effective communication channels despite existing challenges.

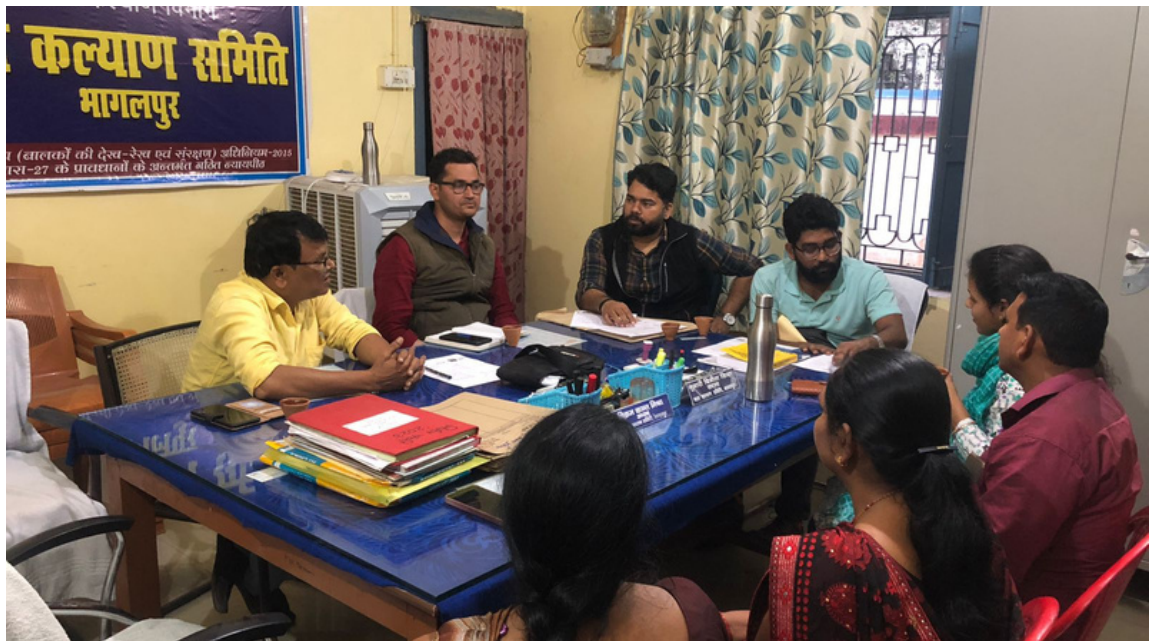
Expanding on the work done earlier, in November 2022, the second phase of the C-RCCE intervention focused on thematic interventions through behavioural shifts, under the themes identified:

OUR WORK TOWARDS BRIDGING ACCESS TO SCHEMES

Bridging Gaps In Access

- COVID-19 vaccination of 12-17 year children and booster dose for adults above 18 years
- Early initiation of breastfeeding and immunization
- Sustained toilet usage
- Central and State Government schemes for health services

In-person capacity-building sessions were organised with 70 district coordinators in Delhi and Chennai and 10 state-level visibility events were organised with partner organisations on the selected themes (pics from visibility events in Rajasthan and Bihar below).



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT IN THE SUNDARBANS

Over the last three years, Praxis spearheaded a consortium of seven organisations, working on a people-centred model of development in the ecologically vulnerable Sundarbans region of West Bengal. This initiative follows a participatory grant-making approach, harnessing the collective efforts of all. The partners have formed more than 100 groups of adolescents, women farmers, marginal farmers and migrant workers in Patharpratima block of South 24 Parganas. Each group works on themes that impacts them the most, ranging from child marriage to climate adaptive livelihoods, from menstruation to embankments. Praxis anchors the consortium, guiding the initiative towards the project goals of participation, sustainability and inclusion. In the last year, Praxis trained partners in the use of Participatory Action Research and importance of documentation. Praxis also facilitated a review workshop and numerous field visits which acted as a catalyst for enhanced collaboration among the consortium partners. UNPACKING ENVIRONMENT AND PARTICIPATION

Praxis undertook a comprehensive study for the Environment Programme of a donor organisation aimed at delving into the intricate interplay of participation and equity within partner organisations dedicated to climate and environmental goals. With a diverse range of sectoral expertise spanning climate change, just transition, clean energy, disaster management, environmental concerns, and the harmonious cohabitation with nature, this study resonates a significant endeavour.

The study's core focus lay in unraveling the nuanced dimensions of participation and equity within this dynamic landscape. Praxis conducted an in-depth analysis of 32 organizations. This involved a review of websites, papers published by the organisations, annual reports. Additionally, Praxis engaged in detailed interviews with 15 of these organisations to understand the scope of their work and the element of participation within their work much further.

The study looked at a range of organisations from grassroots organisations to regranting organisations, from advocacy specialists to climate innovators. The organisations worked across the length and breadth of the country, with a diverse range of stakeholders from the Government of India to state governments, businesses, healthcare systems, communities most vulnerable to climate change and academia. The study will help the donor organisation plan its future strategies of work.

STRENGTHENING EQUITY-CENTRED EVALUATION

Landscape Analysis



Praxis, in collaboration with Praxis UK and the Global Change Center, took on the 'Evaluation Landscape Project' commissioned by the Ford Foundation. The aim of the analysis was to advance 1) understanding of the equity-centered international cooperation evaluation landscape, and 2) identify gaps and opportunities, that if seized, would help increase demand for equity-centered evaluation among international cooperation funders. This endeavour was a joint effort, in collaboration with six other partners from Latin America, Africa, and Asia. This South-led assessment was conducted to bring forth voices from diverse stakeholders engaged in global cooperation. In particular, it paid attention to the often-overlooked perspectives from those based in the Global South, which is where the majority of global cooperation activities are concentrated.

BUILDING ORGANISATIONAL CAPACITY

The 24th edition of TheWorkshop2022, centred on the theme 'Reimagining Participation Post-Pandemic', took place at Kerala Institute of Local Administration in Thrissur from November 7 to 11, 2022. The event brought together 41 participants from diverse corners of the world, spanning countries like Jordan, Kenya, the UK, Singapore, and various parts of India.

The workshop featured modules on

1. Participatory Monitoring and Evaluation
2. Participatory Methods and Approaches

These modules were designed to delve into critical aspects of participation in various contexts, fostering insightful discussions, and promoting cross-cultural learning among participants. Through interactive sessions, TheWorkshop2022 stands as a noteworthy platform for cultivating fresh perspectives on participation in a world marked by the impact of the pandemic.

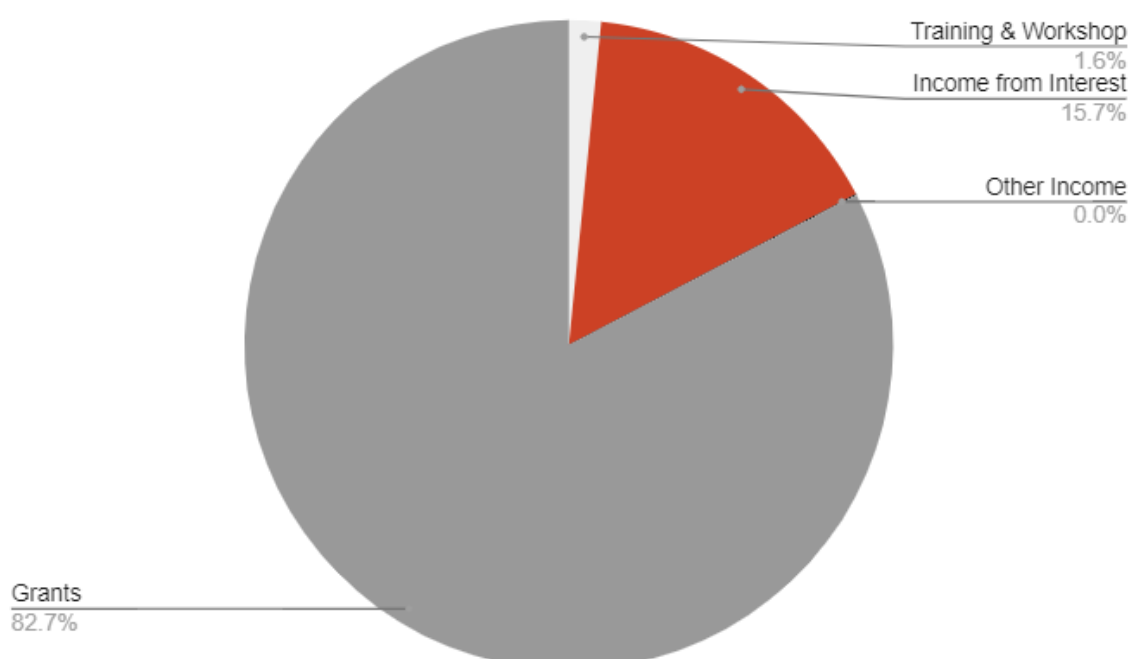

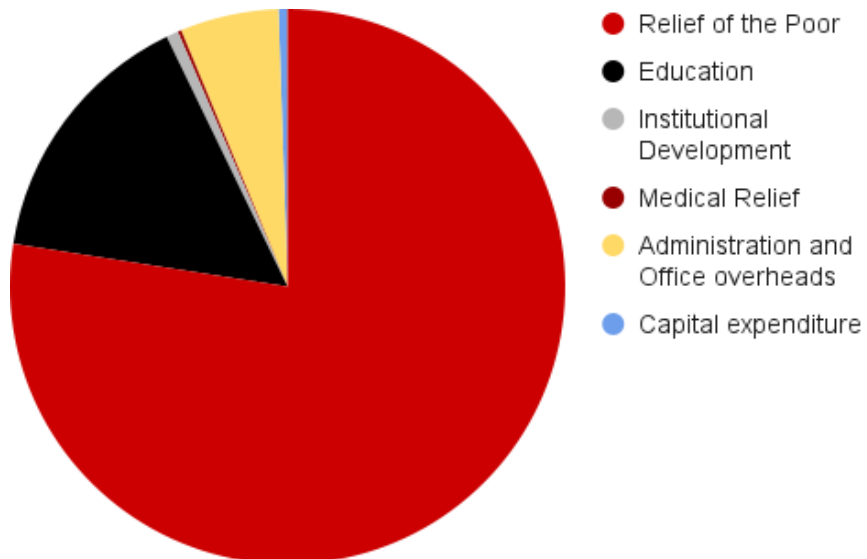

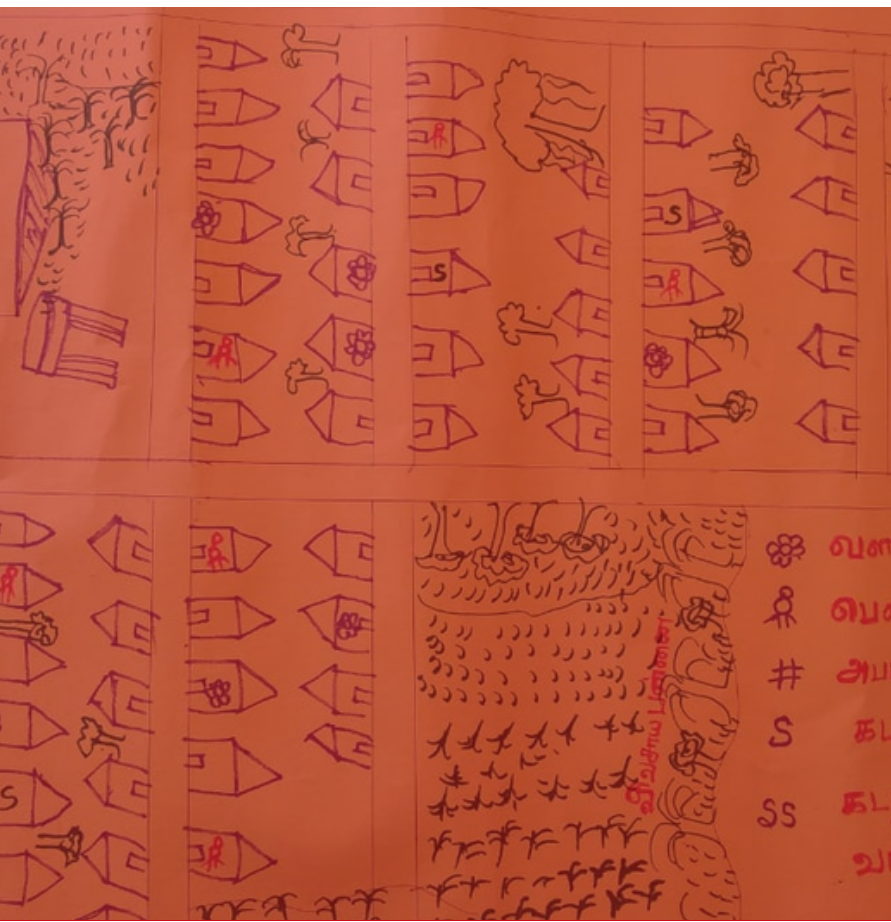
RETREAT 2022

Remembering Anindo Banerjee

On 11 May 2022, Mr Paul Divakar, General Secretary, Global Advocacy and Networks, National Campaign on Dalit Human Rights delivered the first Anindo Banerjee Memorial Lecture on ***"Inclusive Development through Participatory Governance"***.



The lecture was followed by the release of the, ***"Status of Inclusive Development Bihar Report"*** by Mr Jitan Ram Manjhi, ex - Chief Minister, Bihar.

Praxis, in partnership with Jholawala Films launched a media fellowship to help youth tell stories using short films about social justice and equity. The first **Anindo Banerjee Media Fellow** Deepak Mishra, a young documentary filmmaker with disability, based in Delhi, is working on his film 'Potrait of A Person', documenting the life of a queer-trans, neuro-divergent person.
